

## SCRIPTURE READING

Genesis 39:2-6 New International Version

2 The Lord was with Joseph so that he prospered, and he lived in the house of his Egyptian master. 3 When his master saw that the Lord was with him and that the Lord gave him success in everything he did, 4 Joseph found favor in his eyes and became his attendant. Potiphar put him in charge of his household, and he entrusted to his care everything he owned. 5 From the time he put him in charge of his household and of all that he owned, the Lord blessed the household of the Egyptian because of Joseph. The blessing of the Lord was on everything Potiphar had, both in the house and in the field. 6 So Potiphar left everything he had in Joseph's care; with Joseph in charge, he did not concern himself with anything except the food he ate.

## HISTORY OF BACCALAUREATE

Baccalaureate (noun): noun: a celebratory service held before commencement, containing a farewell sermon to the graduating class. The baccalaureate service originated with an English statute of 1432 that required every degree candidate at the University of Oxford (England) to deliver a sermon in Latin. British practice was continued in colonial America, and baccalaureate services have since become an integral part of commencement exercises, marking the completion of an educational program, just as opening convocation marks the beginning.

The first baccalaureate address at Emory College was delivered in Oxford, Georgia, by Bishop William Capers in 1940 (<a href="http://oxford.emory.edu/">http://oxford.emory.edu/</a>).

Eastern University's first Baccalaureate service was held in the spring of 1959 in the gymnasium on the St. Davids campus
