

### **MUSIC NOTES**

T. Tertius Noble founded the renowned St. Thomas Choir School in New York City. First of all, what sort of name is "Tertius," and what does the T initial stand for? It turns out the T is for Thomas, and both his father and grandfather also were named Thomas. He was the third Thomas Noble, therefore he was named Tertius. When he assumed the post at St. Thomas in 1912, he was already at the top of his profession in England. He was the organist at York Minster, where the BMPC Sanctuary Choir performed in 1992... and at the time, his colleagues questioned his sanity. Why would anyone leave "old" York for "New" York? In fact, his successor at York Minister, Edward Bairstow, was asked about his predecessor's decision, he said that he would "rather drop dead than go to America!" "Grieve not the Holy Spirit of God" is one of Noble's finest works, with a soaring soprano solo.

Soprano Kara Goodrich, a child of BMPC, is a graduate of the Academy of Vocal Arts (AVA) who will sing this anthem as a soloist this morning. She attended Eastman School of Music for her undergraduate degree and the University of Michigan for her master's degree. Recently, Kara made her role debut as Mimi in "La Boheme;" Pamina in "The Magic Flute;" and Micaela in "Carmen." Other operatic roles she has performed include Contessa in "Le Nozze di Figaro;" Rusalka in "Rusalka;" Anna in "Le Villi;" Juliette in "Romeo et Juliette;" Conception in "L'heure Espagnole;" and Fiordiligi in "Cosí fan tutte." In addition to AVA, some of the opera companies Kara has worked for include Philadelphia Opera, Annapolis Opera, Utah Festival Opera, and more.


