PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Today's Prayer of Confession is taken from Call to Worship: Liturgy, Music, Preaching and the Arts, volume 58.1

TODAY'S MUSIC

In reading and digesting the verses from Psalm 90 heard this morning, I kept thinking of The Lord's Prayer. Though we, together, affirm our faith using the Lord's Prayer on Sunday morning, and no doubt at various times in the week, there is something profound about being in conversation with God both corporately and in a more personal sense. Today's first anthem, a short setting of the Lord's Prayer by Maurice Duruflé, a renowned French 20th-century composer, is paired with, or perhaps mirrored by, the prelude by Felix Mendelssohn. Mendelssohn's sixth and final Organ Sonata uses the Lutherna Chorale "Vater unser in Himmelreich" (Our Father in Heaven) as its musical framework, presented in a variety of ways. A Lutheran Chorale, a French Catholic composer, and our collective reading and speaking in English, a stark reminder of the breadth and depth of those sacred and Holy words. The second anthem is by the American composer, Moses Hogan, with whom the Sanctuary Choir had the opportunity to work some years ago. His lively anthem "Are you Anchored in the Lord" is a spirited work reminding us of our faith and hope in God, even in times of trial, temptation, and turbulence.
