



#### **FILLING THE WELL**


Starting back January 7, 8:45 a.m. Children's Library, Education Building

#### THE LENTEN SEASON 2024 - THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

As we make our way from Ash Wednesday through Holy Week this year as a whole congregation, we will study and reflect on the significance of the Ten Commandments for our lives today. During our Adult Education hour on Sundays in Lent, we will expand our thinking about the Law beyond the Ten Commandments to better understand the meaning of Law within the fullness of our tradition.





January 25 through February 22, 10:00 a.m., via Zoom



### DELIVERED INTO COVENANT: PIVOTAL MOMENTS IN THE BOOK OF EXODUS




