

THE ETHICS OF THE COVID-19 VACCINE DISTRIBUTION. Fri., Jan. 22 at 10:00 a.m. Via Zoom conference call. Hosted by the Senior Adult Council. All are invited to this presentation by BMPC member Dr. Richard Allman, MD, rheumatologist and medical ethicist at Einstein Medical Center in Philadelphia. Rich serves on the PA Department of Health Ethical Allocations Committee and will address the ethics of allocation of scarce resources in a pandemic. He will discuss how our faith relates to allocation of critical care beds, scarce medications, ventilators, and what we owe to those who are unable to receive scarce resources, particularly access to vaccines.
